
August 19, to perfect the military routine that they will perform for our first varsity game.



# Farrow Takes Lead In "Baby"; "Ivy"Sets Pace For New Flicks

"Rosemary's Baby", starring Mia Farrow and John Cassavetes, Paramount Pictures, Directed by William Castle.

If you are in the vicinity of the UA Cine drop in and see "Rosemary's Baby". But beware, it is not for the faint of heart.

Mia Farrow makes her major film debut, and a successful one, as the innocent young Rosemary who has a "devil" of a time with her husband, her neighbors, and witchcraft. Her actor husband, played by John Cassavetes, is equally good. Maurice Evans, as her elderly and kindly friend, is another one of the highlights of the film. Ruth Gordon is probably the most outstanding member of the cast, giving an almost unbelievable performance as the neighbor.

The story unfolds innocently enough as Mia and John move into exclusive old New York apartment. This is where all their trouble originates. The moment John Cassavetes meets the next door neighbors you have a feeling that all is not right. During the course of the film it developes that John feels success is more important than love, his wife or children and eventually betrays her. The events that follow are both shocking and suspenseful. The climax is exactly that when the witches are revealed to us as is Rosemary's baby.

"Rosemary's Baby" is possibly shocking, possibly sacriligous, but still possibly a great movie. Pray for "Rosemary's Baby"!

"For Love of Ivy", starring Sidney Poitier, Palomar Pictures International.

"For Love of lvy", written and produced by Sidney Poitier, marks a new frontier for the Negro actor. As Poitier himself put it, "For the first time on the screen, the Negro can see himself in a respected position, and not as the habitual general laborer."

Poitier's acting in the film is perfection, and the subtle hints Poitier has written into the script concerning black-white relationships are performed exquisitely.

Abbey Lincoln makes her major role debut as Ivy Moore, maid to the owner of a department store in New York City. After nine years on the job, Ivy decides she needs a change and this is where the plot is developed.

One major point highly worth mentioning is the generation gap subtly developed in the plot. Although Ivy is accepted by the family as a whole, she is much more loved and respected by the family's two teenage children.

The flick is shot on a variety of locations ranging from the inside of a tandem trailer to a hippie play which has been going continuously for 14 weeks. The photography in "lvy" is first rate, often capturing illusions one would not ordinarily find in a movie of this nature.


In closing, one word to the Sophomores - if you think you're confused, you should have seen this staff trying to make our first deadline.


Under the leadership of quarterback MIKE THOMPSON and the


