You are in a garden and are lighting a match. Do not ask me what you would be doing lighting a match in a garden; just pretend that you are.

Suddenly, a wave of fear spreads throughout the garden's inhabitants - yes, the inhabitants - the plants.

Although this statement sounds like another story out of "Twilight Zone," such an occurrence is possible. Experiments indicate that plants are capable of experiencing fear, apprehension, relief, and pleasure.

An accidental discovery made three years ago, by Cleve Backster, led to the awareness of the unusual perception which plants possess. Mr. Backster is a former member of the CIA and director of the Leonarde Keeler Polygraph Institute of Chicago.

Using a polygraph, Mr. Backster was attempting to measure the rate of moisture ascent in plants.

It has been known that plants do have some electrical activity.

Aroused by the implications of the graph, Backster decided to light a match and burn the leaf which was being tested. The polygraph needle made a dramatic change at the exact time of his decision. Mr. Backster had not moved or spoken, and concluded that the plant sensed possible harm.

Determined to remove doubt concerning the plant's behavior, he bought some living brine shrimp and dumped them into boiling water. Again, the plant registered a great change on the polygraph, presumably because of the death of the shrimp.

Repeated observation had led to the story that many cells have a sensing capacity. The amoeba, mold, paramecium, fruit, and even vegetable cells have shown this capacity in other tests.

All attempts at blocking this signal or sense have been futile. Even distance seemingly has no effect on the transmission or reception of signals.

Plants have had a long time to use this perception or means of communication. Being rooted in the ground, what else could they do?

## Cornwell Selection Wise

The campaigning is over, the voting is done. The student body has elected Knowles Cornwell as its new president, and a wise decision it was indeed. This was a first in WTW elections and it signified to us a thoughtfully constructed campaign which represented the sincere interest and concern which Knowles holds for the student body and the school's future.

We believe that now is the time for students to take their places as mature young adults and to present their wishes and desires in an orderly manner before their representative body. Under the direction of Knowles and his associate officers, Mary Lynn Bibbs and Lanny Temple, the Student Council is on its way to becoming more effective unit than ever before in the school's history. —David Rosen

## New Activity Card Unwise

With the recent approval of a new student activity pledge, the issue of student demonstrations in high school has been brought to a focal point.

Instead of being a much needed reform, the new pledge is simply a more specific and restrictive one.

Most notable of the new restrictions is the clause which outlaws all boycotts, demonstrations and related acts. There is no delineation between peaceful activities which do not affect the ability of other students to go about their usual business and demonstrations which affect those not interested.

Dr. Emmett Conrad, one of the two board members who voted against the measure stated that he thought the rule was unconstitutional.

The fact that it was instituted at all is surprising in itself. Just six weeks ago, the Supreme Court upheld the right of public school students to peacefully demonstrate by a 7-2 majority. The case involved five junior and senior high students who were suspended for wearing black arm-bands in protest of the war in Viet Nam. Justice Abe Fortas, in writing the majority opinion, felt that by preventing students from expressing a political opinion, the school officials had violated the right of free speech.

Why should we be coerced into signing a document by which we relinquish one of our constitutionally guaranteed rights? And when failure to sign results in punishment, the signature's value is decreased.

Vocal dissent and the right to assemble in criticism of the government, the community or the school board are among our most important rights. What is it called when one loses the right to participate in the choosing of his own destiny?

## BAND

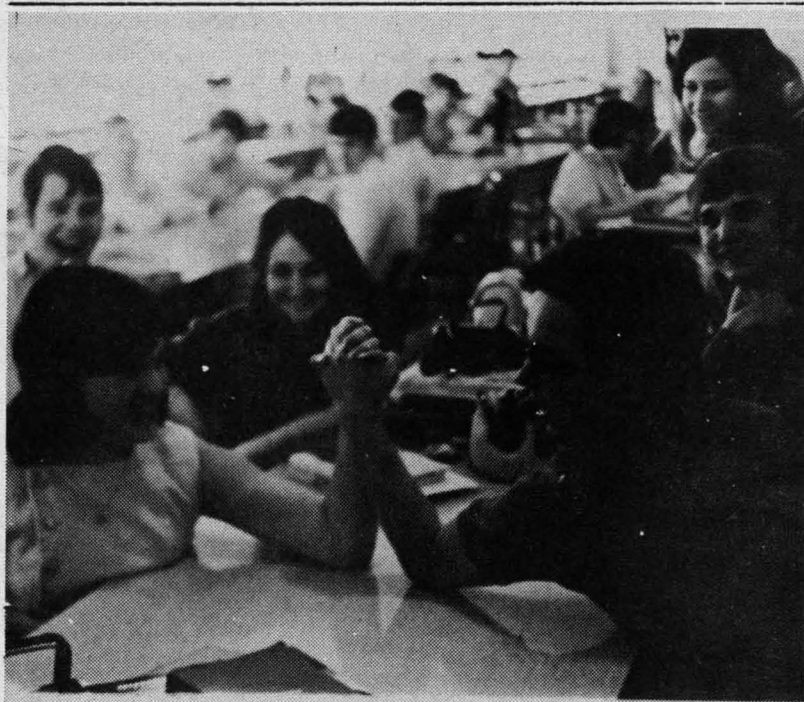
The Longhorn Band performed in a concert as a part of a Fine Arts Festival on Monday, April 22. On April 18, the band made a film at KRLD, Channel 4.

Denise Glascock, a junior, won first place in the Math division and Christy Martin, a sophomore, won

third place in Girls' Biology at the Regional Science Fair.

Denise Glascock's project was

entitled "Latitude and Longitudes" and dealt with the study of latitude and longitudes.

The illustrated methods of how to find the degrees of latitude and longitude of specific locations by plotting the location of her own home. One method Denise used was by the guidance of Polaris, the North Star; another was by the use of astro-lades.

Christy Martin's project was entitled "Differential Uptake of the Radial Isotope Iodine 131 by the Normal Mouse." The radioactivity count in a dead mouse is not accurate unless its taken after a twenty-four hour period because in the last four hours of this time period, two-thirds of the total iodine intake is absorbed by the animal's organs.

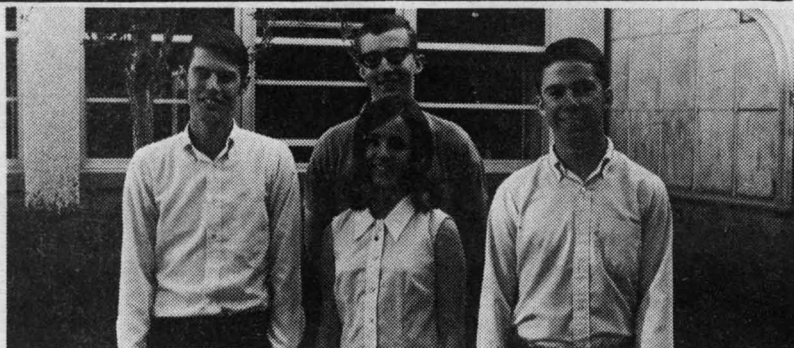

Dog Night, and the Letter. These headliners will appear twice, with top area groups playing in between. Tickets are general admission and cost \$5.

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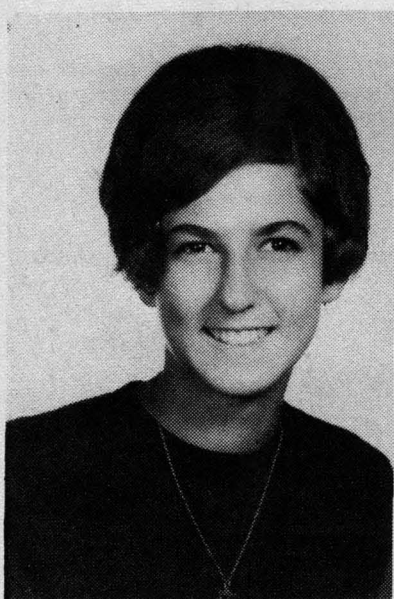

Junior Achievement is a very profitable organization for enterprising teenagers, and Bob Relyea is one such teenager.

Bob joined J.A. three years ago as a sophomore. In his first year, he was the quality control manager

of his company. It was his job to inspect the products, in this case hot-plates. As a junior, Bob was president of a company which sold feathered flowers and pillows.

In November, Bob became part of a new company, Jacose. Because the Sears Department Store on Valley View is their sponsor, the members of the company contracted Junior Achievement of Sears to form the name of their company. After the name was decided, a product had to be chosen. Since many of the members of Jacose were new to Junior Achievement, it was decided to sell feathered flowers, which are very successful commercially.

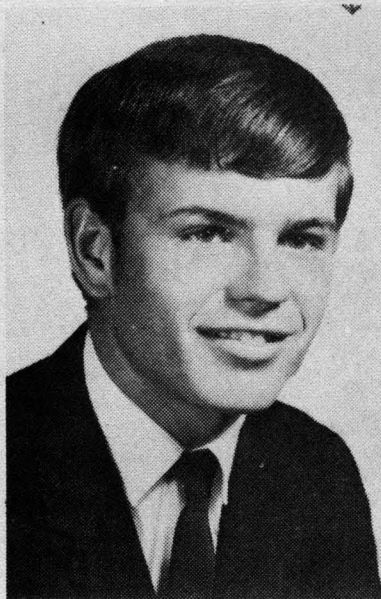
The idea behind Junior Achievement. They choose a product to sell, sell shares of their company, and enter into business. Each company has a sponsor company which acts as an advisor, but the teenagers do all the work and made the decisions. The teenagers learn every phase of business as they work from the creation of their company to its liquidation in the later part of May. If the company has profits, the shareholders receive as dividends their investment and at least ten percent of the profits.

Jacose, with Bob Relyea as president of the company, has been very successful. The company has 133 shareholders who will reap the rewards of the \$429 profit. A rule of Junior Achievement prevents any person from owning more than one share of a company in order to prevent a major controlling interest. The company is also third in Dallas in sales.

As president of Jacose, Bob has represented his company at several Junior Achievement conventions. He has gone to Oklahoma City and recently represented the Dallas Junior Achievement Chapter in Chicago. At present, Bob is vying for the title of President of the Year.

The benefits from Junior Achievement are many, according to Bob. He feels it is helpful in preparing for business and being able to communicate with different people.

After college, Bob plans to join his father in his privately owned business.

The competition was a two hour test in which sheets with only two questions were passed out at a time. The twenty questions were mostly world problems demanding a knowledge of algebra and geometry.

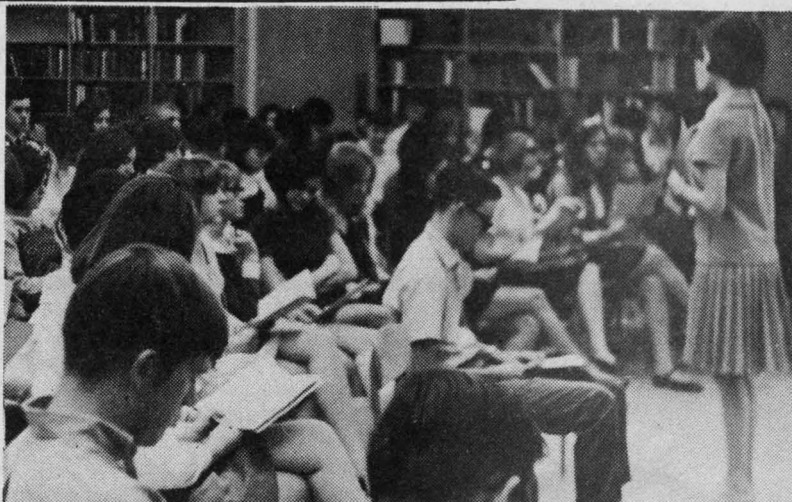
In December, students at White took tests during school in order to attend summer science and mathematics sessions held at universities

The universities select 30 to 60 students from applications they receive.

At SMU, only math courses are available, LSU offers all sciences and mathematics courses, while Michigan State has a program in which students take one science course and one math course. As a whole, "Galveston" is pure Glen Campbell with no gimmicks, only good, clean music.

Alfred Hitchcock presents: "Stories That Scared Even Me". He says that some terrified him, and others disturbed him.

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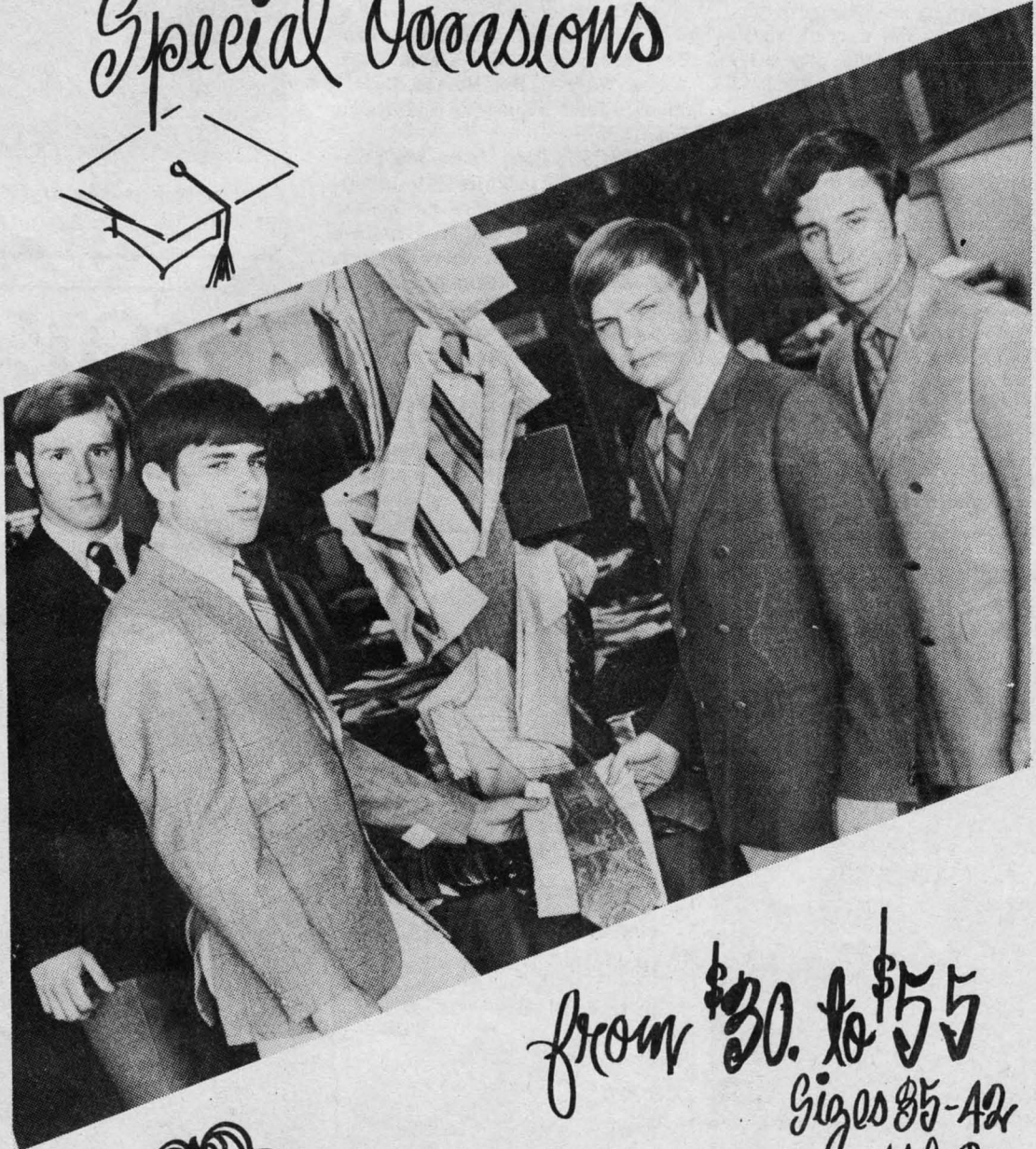
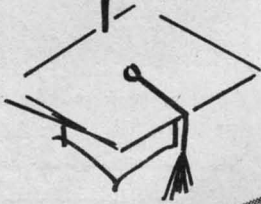


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## Tennis Team Captures District

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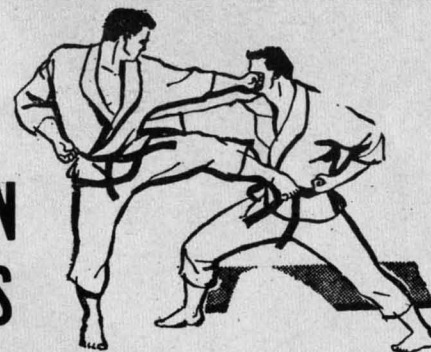
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
