GOOD WORK, GIRLS

MARSH TRADITIONS

LIGHTS GO UP

As a precautionary and preventative measure, Thomas C. Marsh Junior High School will be illuminated each night by eleven safety lights. These lights will be erected to aid the prevention of vandalism to our school and will be operated by a time clock. Although the contract deadline is March 1, 1966, according to reports, we may be fortunate enough to have them ready in December.

The Dallas Independent School Board decided to take this precaution last spring. Already the lights have been installed in Dallas high schools. The contract has been completed at some junior high schools, and the lighting program seems to be operating quite satisfactorily. When all junior high schools receive their lights, installation will begin at the Dallas elementary schools.

The eleven light poles will surround Marsh, each of which will be thirty feet high and run by mercury vapor.

The streets also will be illum-

inated by the lights. It is a shame that there is a need for them, but since it is necessary, let us do our part to help keep Marsh attractive and discourage vandalism.

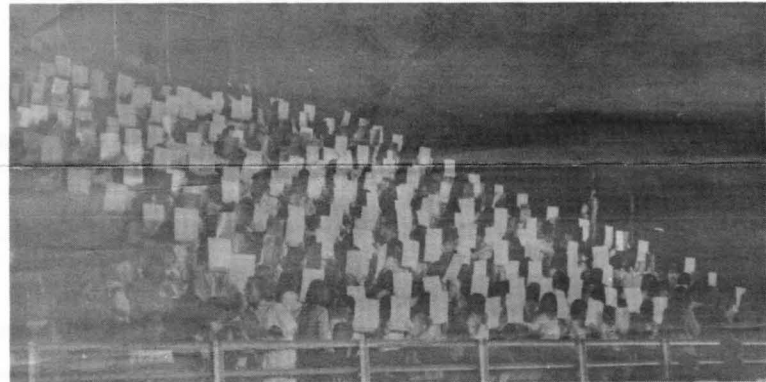
and cowgirl left with fear. But, even if we didn't win, you can't say the Matadors haven't got SPIRIT!

7TH GRADE CITY CHAMPS

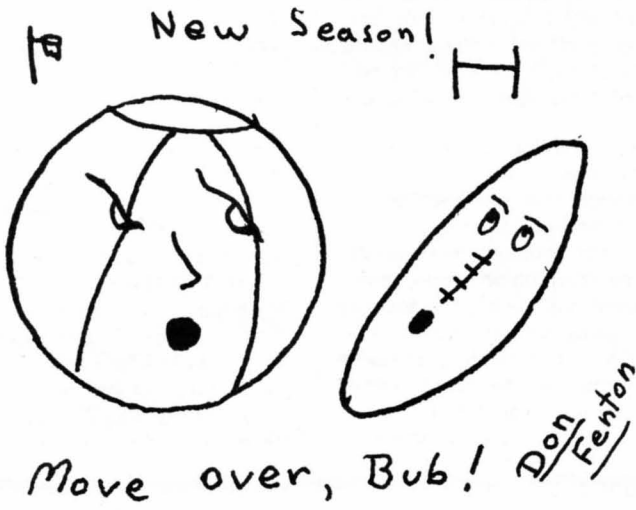
